CELEBRATING 30 YEARS OF **IMPACT**

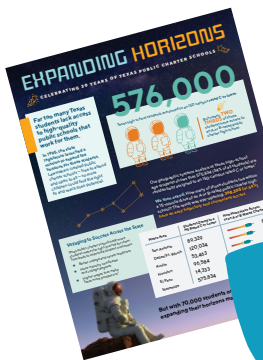
Charter schools have transformed public education in Texas. TPCSA told that story during a yearlong celebration of our community's 30th anniversary – including original research that makes the impact of public charter schools undeniable.

Our three-part series struck a chord with **200,000 parents, educators, and supporters** statewide, who opened **1.1 million emails** and engaged **1,248 times on social media**. Many actively joined the celebration by sharing their own pieces of Texas charter history.

More than **1.5 million students** have attended a Texas public charter school.

Charter schools help **more graduates earn college degrees, industry certifications, and higher wages.**

FINDINGS THAT TELL OUR STORY



Public charter school students enroll in college at a rate about **12 percentage points** higher than students in traditional districts.



370,000 Texas high school students have access to a great public school only because of their proximity to high-performing charters.

That work accelerates as we prepare for the 90th Texas Legislative Session. This year, we have an opportunity to build on historic facilities wins and tackle some of our schools' biggest challenges. **But only if we come together**. TPCSA's advocacy is powerful because it reflects charter schools of every size and model — united by a single voice and purpose.

Thank you for believing in this mission, growing beside us, and providing the resources and feedback we need along the way. I hope the pages ahead remind you how far we have come and inspire you to help write the next chapter for Texas public charter schools.

- ✿ This year, TPCSA helped member schools design **memorable lawmaker events**, showcase the impact of **investments in facilities funding**, and participate in roundtables focused on research and policy issues.
- ✿ Our **Amplify Advocacy Program** activated **24 charter school board members across Texas** — building a larger network of these influential advocates than ever before.
- ✿ Our government affairs team branched out into federal advocacy, meeting with **95% of Texas congressional offices**. These budding connections helped us grow awareness of three pieces of federal legislation championed by the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools that would expand opportunity nationwide.

Elevating Charter School Board Voices

Sarah Tredway, director of the **Amplify Advocacy Program** (AMP), and **Otis "Scotty" Scott, Jr., BRAINATION board president and longtime board advocacy participant**, took the stage at the 2026 National Public Charter Schools Conference. Their session on tapping into the power of board members to grow charter influence inspired more than 300 advocates from across the country.

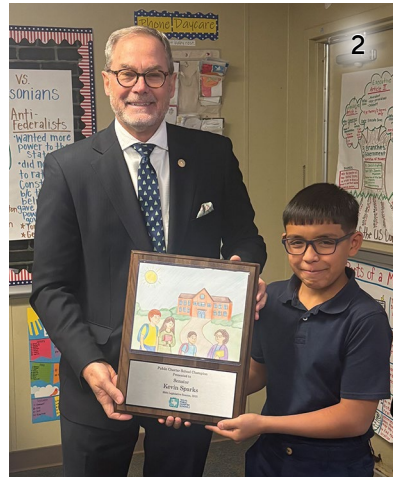


Our community celebrated **68 incredible Charter Champions** from the 89th Texas Legislative Session, featuring a unique piece of student artwork to make each award special.



House Public Education Chairman Brad Buckley is a staunch advocate for public charter schools like **Richard Milburn Academy**, a dropout recovery school helping students turn their lives around. In recognition of his longtime education contributions, a **classroom at the RMA – Killeen campus has been named in Chairman Buckley's honor.**

ADVOCACY IN THE INTERIM

Advocacy doesn't have an off-season. Throughout the interim year, TPCSA cultivated relationships with lawmakers, State Board of Education members, and dozens of candidates who will shape the future of Texas public education. And, we saw fresh evidence that years of steady engagement are creating the right conditions for growth.

This spring, when the **Texas House Committee on Public Education** convened hearings on the state of education and expanding high-performing schools, TPCSA had a seat at the table. Our VP of government affairs, Bryce Adams, gave compelling invited testimony on the charter sector, while **Elizabeth Goldsmith**, founder and executive director of **Thrive Center for Success**, shared the importance of earlier funding projections.

Cynthia Trigg, CEO of Evolution Academy, was invited to represent dropout recovery charter schools. Though public charter schools serve an outsized portion of students seeking a second chance at success, they haven't always had a voice.

Now, they do. With college and career readiness rates rivaling those of standard accountability schools, Evolution Academy blooms with the best. It's pretty hard to impress every member of the committee, but Ms. Trigg did it.



Changing Minds and Warming Hearts

Throughout the year, policy advisors and staffers for **43 state lawmaker offices** joined our government affairs team for candid conversations about top myths circulating at the Capitol.

An October mythbusting tour took key legislative offices to **IDEA Rundberg College Preparatory** in North Austin. Built on the site of a former bowling alley, this A+ campus is now a beacon of opportunity in a neighborhood of underperforming schools — proving that students of all backgrounds can succeed at the highest levels. **Staffers for Governor Abbott, House Speaker Burrows, and 10 other offices** enjoyed the hospitality of IDEA's student baristas.



CLEARING THE WAY FOR GROWTH

Each year, TPCSA dedicates hundreds of hours to pruning red tape and enriching the policy landscape. In 2025-26, we tackled more than **40 proposed regulations** from the Texas Education Agency and State Board of Education — and secured important wins — so that member schools spend less time in the weeds and more time changing lives.



Literary Works List: The SBOE recommended roughly 300 works for consideration, well exceeding the requirement of at least one literary work in each grade and **specifying the year each must be taught**.

Impact: We gave public testimony on the need to preserve curriculum autonomy and organized school advocacy efforts. **Greater flexibility allows texts to be taught in earlier grades as part of advanced curricula**, and the list was reduced by around 100 works.

ESA Implementation: Proposed comptroller rules required schools to provide **proof of accreditation** before becoming an approved provider.

Impact: Thanks to our public comments, the final rules require the comptroller to use electronic verification on the TEA website. This **streamlines the process** for schools that wish to serve families through the Texas Education Freedom Accounts (TEFA) program.

DPS Process: Schools and TEA were wasting time on **letters of good standing** each time they needed access to the DPS background check system.

Impact: TPCSA engaged, and DPS updated its internal processes to **remove the requirement**.

Seed to Sprout: Full Cycle SBOE Engagement

TPCSA provided comprehensive support for the Texas High School for Accelerated Learning as its leaders navigated the rigorous Gen. 31 charter approval process. When THSAL was awarded its charter in June, SBOE Members Brandon Hall and Julie Pickren were among the first to congratulate them.



CHARTER FACILITIES

THE LONG BOUGH OF ADVOCACY

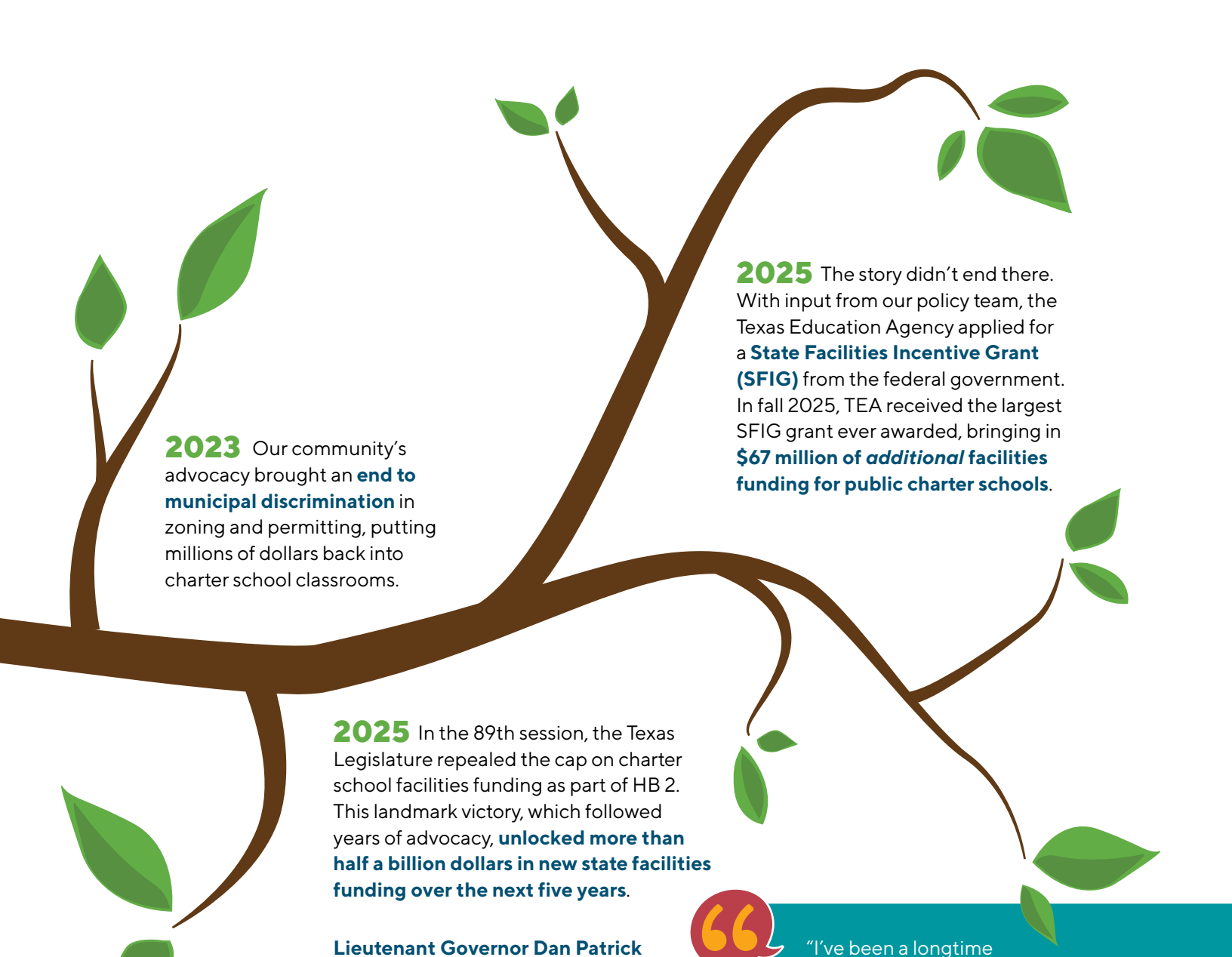
Policy change doesn't happen in a single season. This timeline traces how each advocacy win for charter school facilities grew into the next — blossoming into reduced costs, more cash, and greater access to buildings ready to help kids learn.

2017 In the 85th Texas Legislature, Texas Senator Donna Campbell filed a bill to increase public charter school facilities funding. With the leadership of Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, the Texas Legislature made a **\$60 million investment in public charter school facilities**.

2021 TPCSA advocated for the State Board of Education to significantly expand the **Permanent School Fund (PSF) Bond Guarantee** amount, lowering interest for public charter schools using the program to build and renovate facilities.

2023 Our community's advocacy brought an **end to municipal discrimination** in zoning and permitting, putting millions of dollars back into charter school classrooms.

2025 The story didn't end there. With input from our policy team, the Texas Education Agency applied for a **State Facilities Incentive Grant (SFIG)** from the federal government. In fall 2025, TEA received the largest SFIG grant ever awarded, bringing in **\$67 million of additional facilities funding for public charter schools.**

2025 In the 89th session, the Texas Legislature repealed the cap on charter school facilities funding as part of HB 2. This landmark victory, which followed years of advocacy, **unlocked more than half a billion dollars in new state facilities funding over the next five years.**

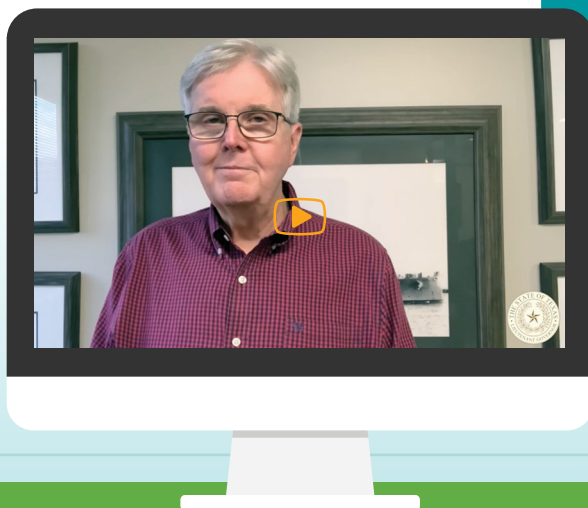

In 2025, TPCSA expanded its member services team so we could work even more strategically to get members the support they need — from creating dozens of new webinars and policy resources to connecting schools to the right solution providers. Our team also invested in innovative solutions to help new and established schools flourish.

- Our **upgraded job board** helped members recruit qualified candidates nationwide.
- We partnered with InsiteEFS to build a **sophisticated mapping tool** with demographics, real estate data, and other insights for targeted expansion.
- We provided deep coaching and planning support to **nine new charter schools** as they laid the foundations for success.

Teach Like a Champion Super Users

Each year, member schools complete more than **20,000 continuing education hours** through online webinars and our statewide conference. But several schools have made their strongest gains through initiatives like our in-person Teach Like a Champion workshops.

We recently connected with a few "super users" — schools that sent several teachers and coaches in 2024 and 2025, creating a critical mass of educators equipped with the same strategies.



Unlocking the Power of Greater Facilities Funding

Before the passage of House Bill 2, **Cedars Academy** faced a dilemma. The school had outgrown its buildings, but securing a new home in East Austin was simply too expensive.

That's why Dr. Leslie Sparacello, the superintendent, became the face of TPCSA's 2024-25 facilities funding campaign. She repeatedly met with lawmakers and testified at the Capitol multiple times during the 2025 session.

In fall 2026, Cedars Academy began the year in its brand-new campus. In May, we even took a few legislative staffers to tour the new building and see the impact of their support during the 89th session. According to Dr. Sparacello, it's a true Cinderella story — from cramped portable buildings and teaching in the cafeteria to ample classrooms with plenty of light and space for learning and play.

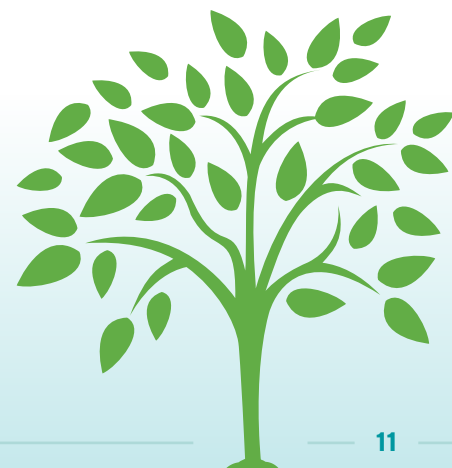
"We are absolutely, over-the-moon excited," she shared. Two weeks later, trucks arrived to take Cedars to its new home.



For Cedars, additional facilities funding means the community can stay together. That means everything to parents like Brianna Everett, a Cedars graduate whose two sons are thriving at the school today. (She even met her husband at Cedars in middle school.)

Planting New Seeds for Success

Every public charter school should have access to the facilities its students deserve. Today, some traditional districts are bending over backward to prevent public charter schools from purchasing unused buildings. Our **top priority in the 90th session** will be to give charters the first right of refusal for vacant buildings and to prevent deed restrictions that block buyers of those buildings from using them as schools.

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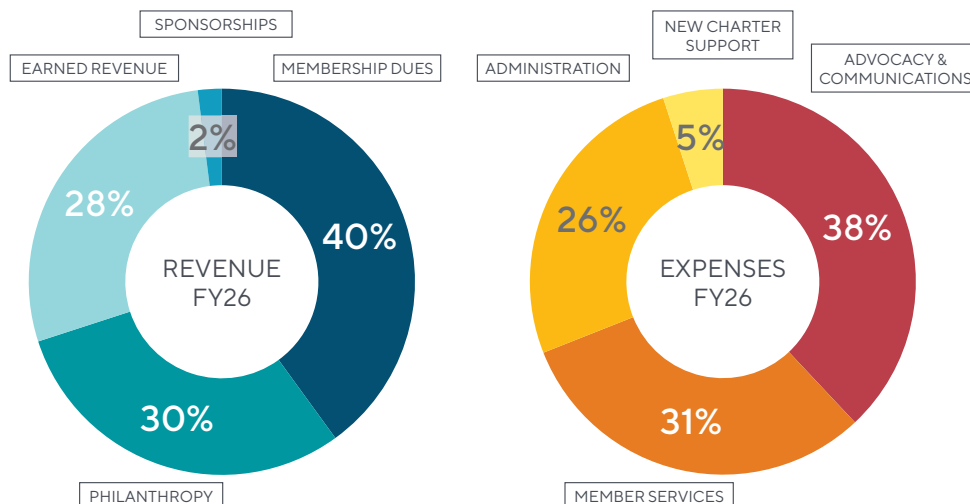

The 90th Texas Legislative Session is our next opportunity to turn mission into momentum. Together, we will advocate for policies that strengthen high-quality public education for the 446,633 students enrolled in Texas public charter schools — and the thousands more who deserve the same chance.

Priorities for the 90th Session



School Buildings Are For Schools

Prohibit deed restrictions that block future educational use and allow a first right of refusal for public charter schools to keep public schools open where possible.



Cut Red Tape on Public Schools

Identify and remove any barriers and mandates that hamper schools but do not move the needle on student achievement.



Equalize TRS Contributions

Equalize contributions across all types of participating employers.



Protect Student Safety and Improve Career & Technical Education

Allow public charter schools to authorize crossing guards and hire the best teachers for noncore CTE courses — as ISDs already can.

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
