HB 3610 (Gervin-Hawkins)

Create Property Tax Parity For All Public Schools

The Problem

Schools—public and private—do not pay property taxes on buildings they own. But public schools (charter schools, ISDs, and community colleges) must use state funds to pay local property taxes on school buildings they lease. These funds could—and should— be used on teacher salaries, improved technology, instructional materials, and other critical classroom needs. It is estimated that public charter schools could keep 12 million dollars in their classrooms if they were exempt from paying property taxes on their leased school buildings.

The Solution

HB 3610

will:

Exempt all public schools—including charter schools, ISDs, and community colleges—from paying property taxes on their leased school buildings. This legislation will ensure that critical dollars go where they are needed most: toward classroom instruction, supplies, technology, and other crucial school needs.

Grant a property tax exemption on real property a person owns and leases to a public school if:

The real property is used exclusively by the school for educational functions;

The real property is reasonably necessary for the operation of the school; and

The owner certifies that the rent for the lease of the real property will be reduced by an amount equal to the tax savings.

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
