

English Learners Thrive at Texas Public Charter Schools



Nearly 120,000 English language learners (ELLs) attend Texas public charter schools. That's 31% of all charter school students, compared to 22% of all public school students statewide. Texas public charter schools are helping English language learners gain crucial language skills more quickly — and achieve college and career success.


Accelerating Academic Growth



If Texas public charter schools were their own state, their ELL students would rank #1 in the **U.S.** for performance on the NAEP reading exams for fourth and eighth graders in 2022.2








These language gains translate into higher growth rates on STAAR exams. Compared to their peers statewide, more ELLs at Texas public charter schools made progress across all subjects (77% vs. 72%) and in reading (82% vs. 77%).3


