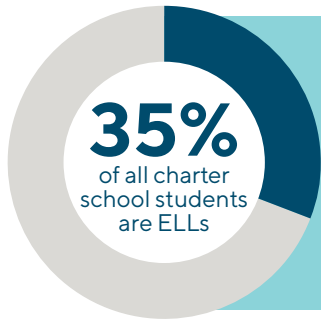


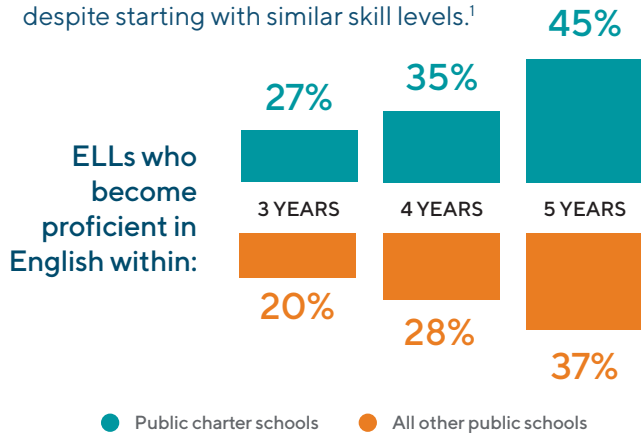
# English Learners Thrive at Texas Public Charter Schools



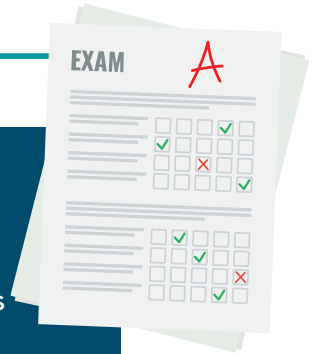
Nearly **150,500** English language learners (ELLs) attend Texas public charter schools. That's 35% of all charter school students, compared to 25% of all public school students statewide. Texas public charter schools are helping English language learners gain crucial language skills more quickly – and achieve college and career success.<sup>3</sup>

## Accelerating Academic Growth

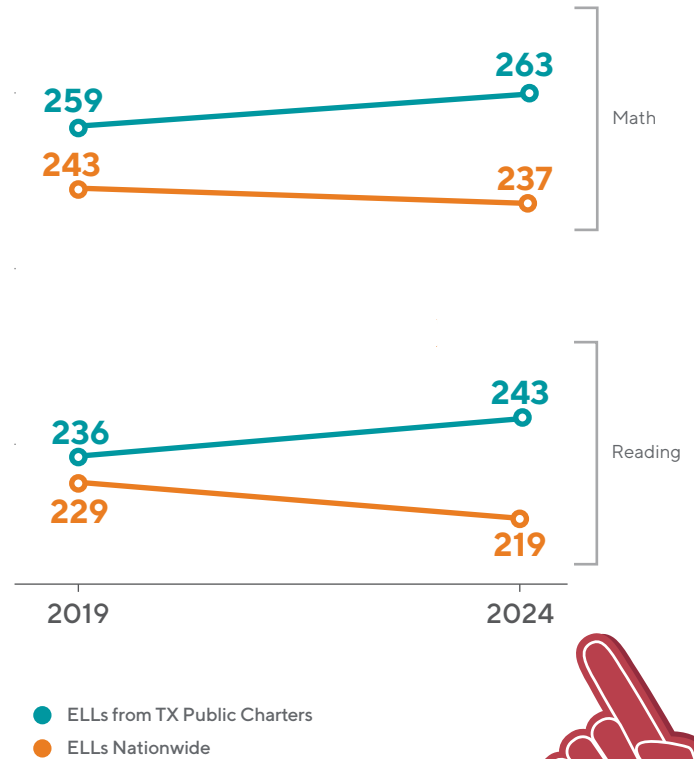
ELLs in Texas achieve language proficiency faster when they attend public charter schools, according to a 2023 study by the Thomas B. Fordham Institute, despite starting with similar skill levels.<sup>1</sup>



If Texas public charter schools were their own state, their ELL students would rank **#1 in the U.S.** for performance on the NAEP math and reading exams for eighth graders in 2024.<sup>2</sup>

These language gains translate into higher growth rates on STAAR exams. Compared to their peers statewide, **more ELLs at Texas public charter schools made progress across all subjects (61% vs. 58%) and in reading (62% vs. 57%)**.<sup>3</sup>

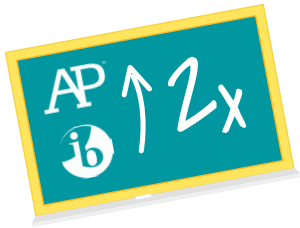

# Achieving College and Career Success

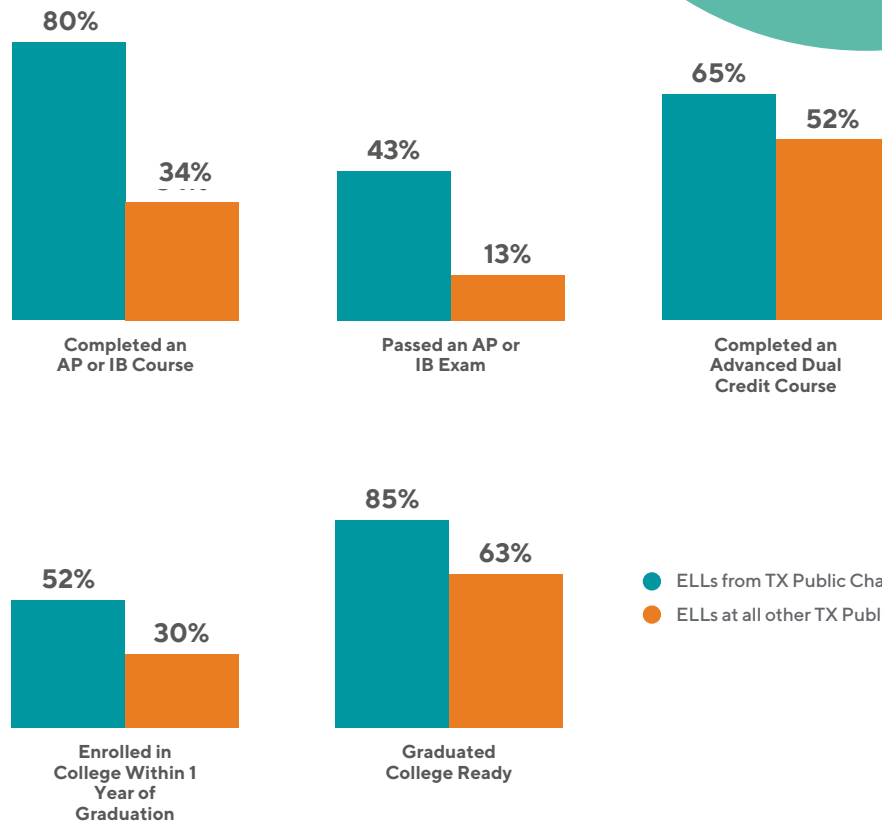
ELLs and former ELLs who were enrolled at Texas public charter schools in high school earn about **\$2,000** more annually in their early careers, according to a 2023 study by the Thomas B. Fordham Institute.



ELL graduates from Texas public charter schools are **twice as likely** to have completed rigorous Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and dual credit courses.<sup>3</sup>



Those advanced skills put more students on track for college. ELLs who graduate from Texas public charter schools are **twice as likely** to meet the state standard for college readiness and to enroll in higher education.

Despite receiving **\$1,621** less per student, public charter schools invest

- **\$242** more on basic educational services and
- **\$37** more on bilingual education compared to the statewide average for all public schools.
